

# FROM YOUR RECTOR



## The Black Dot

One day, a professor entered his classroom and asked his students to prepare for a surprise test. They all waited anxiously at their desks for the exam to begin.

The professor handed out the exams with the text facing down, as usual. Once he handed them all out, he asked the students to turn over the papers.

To everyone's surprise, there were no questions—just a black dot in the center of the paper. The professor, seeing the expression on everyone's faces, told them the following: "I want you to write about what you see there." The students, confused, got started on the inexplicable task.

At the end of the class, the professor took all the exams, and started reading each one of them out loud in front of all the students.

All of them, with no exception, defined the black dot, trying to explain its position in the center of the sheet. After all had been read, the classroom silent, the professor started to explain:

"I'm not going to grade you on this, I just wanted to give you something to think about. No one wrote about the white part of the paper. Everyone focused on the black dot – and the same thing happens in our lives.

However, we insist on focusing only on the black dot – the health issues that bother us, the lack of money, the complicated relationship with a family member, the disappointment with a friend. The dark dots are very small when compared to everything we have in our lives, but they are the ones that pollute our minds. Take your eyes away from the black dots in your lives. Enjoy each one of your blessings, each moment that life gives you. Be happy and live a life filled with love!"

These words echo those of another wise teacher who said, "I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full. John's gospel, chapter 10 and verse 10. This summer, why not start to learn to

live life to the full? You can begin by looking at, and enjoying, all the white space in your life, your blessings, and each moment that life gives you.

# The Binfield ARC project: Fundraising for essential repairs to our historic Parish Church

All Saints' Church Needs Your Help!

## **Fundraising Update:**

Phase 1 repair work is now well under way. The old tiles on the Eastern end of the roof, which is being replaced in this phase, are all off and the new ones are going on, along with insulation which will offer more protection and a bit more warmth this winter! The new tiles include all the 334 which were tagged with messages including bible verses, dates of special events including weddings and christenings held at the church, and even a marriage proposal through our Tag-A-Tile initiative! Big thanks go especially to William Bell and also Claire Murphy for all their work running the scheme which has raised another £1800 for the project. We are hoping that all these tiles will be installed along the front of the roof, so that you can look to see where vours is!

More thanks are due to Jacqui Voller and Nick Debney for their **Sing for Fun and Summer Sing** sessions, which also raised a brilliant £706 and the June Ladies Retreat which raised another £180.

If you are looking for something to do in the summer holidays, make sure the **Community Get Together** dates are in your diary when a team of lovely ladies are putting on two events, on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> August and Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> August, at St. Mark's Church, with refreshments and toys available for the younger kids. All profits raised from these events will go to the repair fund.

And if you are jetting off abroad and come back with any foreign currency, or have any coins or notes lying around at home, we are now collecting these, and old currency. Please see the website for details of what we can accept, and bring anything you have to the collection point at All Saints' or to St Mark's during office hours.





# Remembering David Fawcett A life well lived


One of a large family, David grew up in Nottingham (and was a supporter of Nottingham Forest for the rest of his life). Nobody seems to know where he got the idea that he wanted to go to university but he was quite determined and devised a cunning plan. Telling his mother that the headmaster of his school wanted to see her, he then went to the headmaster, explaining that his mother would like an opportunity to discuss his future. The meeting was thus arranged and it was decided: David should apply to university. It was lucky that he did, for in his second year at Bristol, he met Ruth. Pictures from this time show a glamorous couple (DJ for David, stunning black dress for Ruth at the Union Ball 1956). Others show weekends hostelling and David rowing a boat. Ruth observed that David also played a lot of Bridge. Another photo shows a ringing weekend in the Lord Mayor's Chapel. They were clearly enjoying university life.

If you owned a television back then, you might have seen them in 1959 on a game show for engaged couples: Full House. In order to appear the following week, you had to win – which they did, again and again and again until they had enough furniture to set up home. Then they got married. One of the photographs from the show has Ruth pouring an (imaginary) cup of tea for David, surrounded by the rest of the Bamboo patterned crockery which is still in use today. I well remember all that furniture which they won and indeed their entire kitchen, kitted out from the same source.

David and Ruth were married in Bristol. A wedding photo shows a radiant bride in a beautifully cut dress and pretty feathered hat. The proud groom is looking very smart in his best suit. Outside the church, Ruth's girl guides form a guard of honour. The wedding breakfast was unconventional: lunch at a Chinese restaurant (booked on Sunday for the wedding on Monday).

In 1962, David and Ruth moved to Binfield - and Ruth says firmly, "It was the best thing we ever did". The house and garden needed a lot of work but it has been a wonderful family home and they have been surrounded by a strong community. Helen arrived and then little Katie. They were now a team of four.

As they grew up, David was keen that his team should feature in another game show and, as Helen recalls, wrote to Ask the Family – in his usual



beautiful, carefully formed writing. The response he got was that, although welcome to apply, he should ask his parents first.

Holidays were spent in Cornwall, near Helston with a convenient walk up Tregonning Hill, trips on the boating lake and the lure of fish and chips. Later, they stayed in Penzance. There were other walks, sometimes to ancient monuments – one involved climbing through the granite disc (Katie thinks it was to ensure that they didn't get bandy legs). If the path was not well marked - with the possibility of brambles – and cows – Ruth led the way. They went to the beach when the weather was good but always left at 5 o'clock. Katie has taken a while to realise that she is actually allowed to stay a bit longer when she is on a beach with her own family. Helen told me that at home, as her Dad was always smartly dressed, friends of hers assumed that he was 'just back' from some formal engagement. Not so. He did make an exception for the beach and removed his tie. He was not keen to bend the dress code too far and his usual attire for sand and sea was a shirt and full length trousers. Years later, the girls realised that 'the beach' was not something he was really keen on and he rarely went in the sea. Every year the rest of them vied to be in the water first. Once, memorably, the first one in was David. He came out - and did not go back in again.

David taught maths at Ranelagh School for many years. He became Head of the Maths Department, and later, a meticulous timetabler. On his retirement, Richard Allen, the headmaster, wrote....'Mr Fawcett became Senior Master with special responsibilities, including the timetable.

Later, he took on the administrative network system. ... I was impressed by how much he could carry in his mind and by his rapid grasp of what could or could not be arranged. When computers first arrived, anxious that we should understand how they worked, his explanation would start with: 'It's quite simple really...' He gave unstintingly: the scout troop, Bridge, the Boat Race, the Inter-house quiz, the PTA and the staff cricket match (lengthy forward planning and detailed post -match review!) However busy he was, he never missed School Worship. His own assemblies revealed insight and appreciation. In the classroom he excelled. He was a dedicated allround schoolmaster and we thank him, and Ruth who always found time in her own busy life to support us..... There was a lot more, but especially noted was: 'He and his wife set the highest standards of ballroom dancing.'

David loved teaching Maths, and many will be grateful to him: he always wanted the best for them. As many of you will know, after he had retired, he continued to teach, determined to help those who struggled and to encourage the talents of the very able. He was unfailingly enthusiastic and very successful. Some of the tributes which have been paid underline this: "Maths was not their strength but he somehow managed to help them penetrate the fog" ...and another..." He seemed to switch my son's brain on."

Anyone who knew David knew his passion for sport: as player and supporter. Katie recalls attending several Rugby Internationals and Spurs games to which he also took his godson. They also saw Spurs in the FA cup final. He drove her to school hockey matches and tournaments, cheering on her team from the touchline. For David's 70<sup>th</sup> birthday, Helen's husband, Greg organised tickets for the Heineken cup final at the Millennium stadium.

David had a very full life and gave his time generously. He did the accounts for several organisations, was a Borough and Parish councillor, ('The best chair they ever had' according to the Parish Clerk) was Chair of Governors of Binfield Junior School, Chair of the M.S. Society, and had many church roles. Always a staunch supporter of the Labour Party, he would attend party conferences, and also accompany Ruth to those for the NUT. In their spare time, they were at the Garden Club doing first an RHS General certificate and then the Advanced Diploma. One outstanding achievement which I would like to emphasise is his Master's degree for

which he gained a distinction – no mean feat.

He was immensely proud of his family, talking about them all the time. Photos show Helen with her Physics degree from St Hilda's Oxford, Katie with her Geography from Bristol... both girls with their doctorates. Their academic careers were an unending source of pleasure and interest. Ruth's success as a head teacher, her work on tribunals, her MBE, her intrepid travels abroad: at times, he seemed to be almost in awe of it all.

Then there were the grandchildren whom he thought wonderful - even though the correct name did not always come immediately to mind. He was fine when addressing Peter – the only boy - but faced with three generations of women and a choice of Ruth, Helen, Katie, Anna, Alison, Emma or Zoe - he was not always so lucky. 'Random Female Relative' was the cry.

With these memories of David we celebrate his life: the love of his family, his gifts and achievements, his generosity, his dedication, his loyalty, his friendship and his sense of service to the community. But we cannot think of David without Ruth. Their Golden Wedding was a celebration of the joint life of two people who kept their individuality undiminished in a strong team. Photos show a joyous occasion with contributions from all the grandchildren as well as Helen and Katie. It has to be stressed; Ruth enabled David to be who he was. Ruth held the team together (sometimes alone) supported David and made a great success of her own career. They had an unusual and enviable equality.

Many may not know that David suffered from schizophrenia. It was diagnosed in the early sixties and medically controlled but it took immense courage to throw himself back into life. He was told by the doctor that he could never expect to teach Maths full time again. But of course, the doctor didn't know David. He not only did teach Maths full time, very successfully, but also achieved much, much more; becoming Head of the Maths department at Ranelagh School. Schizophrenia is a mental state that is not much talked about or understood. And that is why David particularly wanted it mentioned at his funeral. It did not define him. The fact that he made such a resounding success of his life despite it, was a triumph, a lasting tribute to him – and to Ruth.

Ruth would like to extend her thanks to everyone who helped at the funeral: "I have been trying to get around to say it personally as I have had so many good comments about every aspect of the funeral service. I know it was such a positive experience for all the family. "

Considerate Car Use and Parking It is somehow refreshing to have some rain after the wonderful Summer weather we have been enjoying! Many people have commented that its providing us with fresh air. Talking of which, in these warm temperatures we would kindly request that you do not leave your car engines running when at a standstill just to keep AC on! This is both a noise pollutant as well as pumping carbon dioxide into the air unnecessarily.

We also have a helpful leaflet from Bracknell Forest Council about using our cars considerately. Such considerations as "Park & Stride", parking further away from your destination and taking a walk, avoiding parking on the pavement, on junctions, on dropped kerbs, verges or where there are parking restrictions. We would also ask you to consider car speed as research shows that if you hit a child at 40mph there is an 80% chance they will be killed.

If you'd like a copy of the Considerate Car Use leaflet – it's a useful reminder jolt for all drivers – then please get in touch.

# Binfield Garden Club

Our speaker at our meeting on 6 July was Ray Broughton, a senior lecturer at Sparsholt College in Winchester, who trained at RHS Garden Wisley and has been teaching a wide range of horticultural subjects for the last two decades. In September 2000 he was awarded a Fellowship by the Chartered Institute of Horticulture in recognition of his service to horticulture. Ray treated us to a very entertaining and informative talk on "The Small Greenhouse and Growing Vegetables".

It is important that your greenhouse has plenty of ventilation but avoid putting vents at the bottom as you don't want cold air near the base of your plants. Sloping sides are very useful as they help make optimum use of winter light so are good for growing winter vegetables. A new innovation in greenhouse lighting is the use of digital lights to supply both red and blue wavelengths – red light makes the plant grow taller and blue light makes it stockier. These lights are 98% efficient and the concept is that they are forever. Other new innovations now on the market are nutra pots which are made of cereal waste and impregnated with nutrients and water gel and smart seed where water gel, nutrients and germination enhancer are added to the coating of the seed preventing erratic germination.

Ray introduced us to a new way of growing potatoes which is to plant them in soil one inch down, cover with organic barley straw with net over the top to keep it in place and water once a week with tomato fertiliser. This ferments the soil and prevents slug or wireworm damage. When ready, move the straw away, pick as many potatoes as required and then put straw back over remainder.

One of Ray's less conventional tips was the use of fresh horse manure (although not steaming!) in a plastic container covered with cling film with a few holes pierced in and then placed in the greenhouse. The oxidation of the manure releases carbon dioxide, the lack of which can cause leggy plants. His other top tip was to use tomato ketchup to clean and sharpen secateurs or even hedge trimmers. Leave on for up to 4 days if particularly bad and then wash off with warm water and dry thoroughly. We're all going to be trying that one!

July's competition for "Sweet Peas" was won by Christine Leonard, 2<sup>nd</sup> Belinda Thornhill and 3<sup>rd</sup> Liz Ferris.

Following on from the very successful plant sale in May, Richard encouraged members to grow as many plants as possible for next year's sale.

# Nineteenth Century Rectors of Binfield

# Dr Gabell's life in Winchester as student and teacher

Henry Dison Gabell, Rector of Binfield from 1821 to his death ten years later, was baptised in March 1764 at St Maurice's Church in Winchester. He was the son of the Reverend Timothy Gabell, a minor canon of Winchester Cathedral and a chaplain at Winchester College. Gabell junior was a pupil, a teacher and eventually head master of Winchester College. He resigned his headship in December 1823.

He was a pupil at Winchester College from 1778, and was elected a scholar a year later. After Winchester, he went to New College, Oxford, becoming a fellow in 1783. He married Ann Gage, "daughter of the Rev. Mr. Gage, of Holton" on 11th January 1790 while he was still a Fellow of New College. He took a post as an "Usher" [school master] at Warminster Grammar School for a short while, and from 1793, was second master at Winchester College until 1810 when he was appointed head master. In 1817 he almost certainly became acquainted with Jane Austin who, during her final illness was his next door neighbour and who, just two months before her death, wrote to her nephew, "Our lodgings are very comfortable. We have a neat little drawingroom with a bow window overlooking Dr. Gabell's garden."

The Gabell's early days at Winchester were also marred by deaths - the infant deaths of three of their children: two daughters, Caroline in 1798 and Jessy in 1800, and of their first-born son. Their eldest daughter, Maria, survived and married William Scott in 1818 when she was 24, and since Dr Gabell's codicil of 1823 mentions two daughters, Susanna, who was born in 1797, clearly survived childhood and probably died in 1851. The same codicil mentions two sons, Henry Leigh and Jacob Henry born in 1796 and 1803 respectively, so both survived infancy. Sadly though, Henry Leigh shared his name with a brother who, less than a year old, had died earlier in 1796, the year of Henry's birth.

The major public incident during Dr Gabell's Winchester headmastership was the 1818 pupil rebellion there. It has been said that he was so disliked by the boys - he had spies amongst the pupils - that they rose up against his rule. But, by the time of his retirement, five years later, his students contributed towards some "magnificent silverware" described in the Oxford University Herald of 27th December 1823 as "a lofty candelabra, richly chased". His obituary in the Gentleman's Magazine of 1831 further mentions also "two massy tureens". Furthermore, the University Herald report contains a lengthy, quite touching, account of Gabell's retirement dinner and of his valedictory speech.

The retirement ceremony shows that Gabell remained headmaster at Winchester for three years after his appointment as rector of Binfield, during which time he was also rector of St Laurence's Winchester, gifted by Lord Chancellor Thurlow in 1788, and of Ashow in Warwickshire in 1812, the gift of Chandos Leigh, then M.P. for the area, later Baron Leigh of Stonleigh. The rectorship of Binfield was also in the gift of the Lord Chancellor's department. This plurality of livings was not uncommon at the beginning of the 19th century. Rectors drew their income from the tithes of parish-held land and appointed curates to act vicariously on their behalf. Provided that the tithe income from his parishes was good – as it was in what has been described as "the rich living of Binfield", rectors could live as gentlemen. Eventually, after Gabell's death, the Pluralites Act of 1838 ruled that no parson could hold more than two livings and then only if they were within 10 miles of each other [reduced to 3 miles by an Act of 1850].

We can glean a little of what Gabell must have been like as a teacher from a lengthy literary and linguistic correspondence he had with Dr Parr, a fellow scholar and teacher whose arguments were usually over-elaborate and peppery. In contrast, Gabell's responses were gentle, sometimes seemingly teasing the certitude of many of Parr's assertive conclusions. They showed Gabell's command of classical Latin and more than an acquaintance with Greek; they evidenced his ear for the rhythm of classical poetry and a sensitive appreciation of the author's intentions; but most of all they reveal - for the times - Dr Gabell's progressive approach to teaching and learning.

An obituary in the Oxford Journal of 23<sup>rd</sup> April 1831 supports this view

"The talents and learning of Dr. Gabell, and the distinguished ability with which he discharged his duties as Second Master, and afterwards as Head Master of Winchester College, during a period of more than 30 years, are well known and justly appreciated. On resigning his important office ....., he carried with him into retirement the best reward of his labours in the affectionate respect of the whole Wykehamical body, and the warm regard of numerous friends, particularly in Winchester, the place of his birth, and the scene of his useful and honourable exertions. In his domestic circle Dr. Gabell was peculiarly cheerful, and studious of the happiness of all around him. His loss will be long and deeply lamented."

The obituary goes on to report: "The last years of his life were devoted to the care of the parish of Binfield, to which he had been presented by the Earl of Eldon, as Lord Chancellor, in requital of the attention bestowed upon the education of his grandson, Viscount Encombe" – the subject of the next instalment.

If you are in good health, between the ages of 17 and 65 and weigh at least 7st. 12lbs (50kg), you could become a blood donor. SMEAR TESTING: Women aged 50 to 64 should have a smear test every 5 years. If you are over 64 and have never had a smear test, you are entitled to have one. Women aged 25 to 49 should have a smear test every 3 years.

CHILD ASTHMA/WHEEZING: If your

child or young person has a wheeze and is not responding to the usual reliever (blue inhaler) treatment, OR is using their blue reliever inhaler more than 2 puffs every four hours, then you need to contact a nurse or doctor at your GP surgery. If the GP surgery is closed, please call NHS 111 by dialling 111. If the symptoms are WORSE than quoted above you must telephone 999 for an ambulance.
