I am hoping that these two stories will be of comfort for those who are struggling with ill health, loss, separation from loved ones and loneliness, and encouragement for those of you who are finding it hard to adjust to these extraordinary circumstances.

#### We are never alone

Do you know the legend of the Cherokee Indian youth's rite of passage?

His father takes him into the forest...blindfolded...and leaves him....alone. He is required to sit on a stump the whole night...and not take off the blindfold until the ray of sun shines through it. He is all by himself. He cannot cry out for help to anyone.

Once he survives the night...he is a MAN. He cannot tell the other boys of this experience. Each boy must come into his own manhood.

The boy was terrified...could hear all kinds of noise...Beasts were all around him. Maybe even some human would hurt him. The wind blew the grass and earth... and it shook his stump. But he sat stoically...never removing the blindfold. It would be the only way he could be a man.



#### **Binfield's Lord Patrick Beresford**

The loss to the UK polo and equestrian eventing community was keenly felt as a great loss to the parish of Binfield with the passing of Lord Patrick Beresford.

Lord Patrick Tristram de la Poer Beresford died peacefully at his Binfield home in March aged 85. His ashes will be buried at the Marquis of Waterford's family estate of Curraghmore, Ireland.

Educated at Eton, Patrick Beresford went on to achieve a notable military career after earning the top cadet's Sword of Honour at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst. Service with the Royal Horse Guards for 11 years, eventually as a Lieutenant, then the Guards Independent Parachute Company, was followed by achieving the rank of Major with R Squadron 22 Regiment Special Air Service, with whom he served in the Middle East and Far East until his retirement in 1974.

This successful military life was followed by the fine horseman's involvement in polo, travelling as a member of the Commonwealth team to tournaments worldwide. Lord Patrick was awarded the Hurlingham Polo Association's Lifetime Achievement Award in his later years.

Born the younger son of the 7<sup>th</sup> Marquis of Waterford in 1934 on the 3,500-acre de la Poer Beresford estate and family seat, Curraghmore, Co Waterford, Patrick made his home in Binfield at Fairview Cottage, Wicks Green. In 1964 he married Julie Jill Williamson; the couple divorced in 1971. Lord Patrick leaves two children from the marriage, son Valentine and daughter Samantha.

The young guardsman was a onetime escort to the Queen's younger sister Princess Margaret and remained close friends with the Duke of Edinburgh and Prince Charles, who both shared his passion for polo. Beresford family-bred polo ponies have long been numbered among the most highly regarded sporting strings worldwide. A current champion breeder, Richard John Beresford, Earl of Tyrone and the future 10<sup>th</sup> Marquis of Waterford, was the nephew of the late Lord Patrick.

A commentator once described Patrick Beresford as "coming from a family of political leaders, soldiers, sailors, clergymen and sportsmen". Lord Patrick maintained close contact with former military comrades and was President of the Guards Parachute Association. As would be expected of a former soldier, he seldom missed Binfield's Annual Remembrance Parade and Service, modestly sitting in one of the rear pews of All Saints' Church.

A tall and personable man of immense charm, many parishioners will remember with pleasure their easy acquaintance with Lord Patrick Beresford.

#### **Gardening for Nature**

Many of us have been spending a lot more time in our gardens than we normally would at this time of year. Even the smallest garden can be a haven for nature and that nature can have restorative properties (author Richard Louv, coined the term 'vitamin n' for this).

Bracknell Forest Council have now launched their Year of the Garden campaign, with the following statement:

"Go wild in your garden and help the Bracknell Forest Nature Partnership to celebrate the Year of the Garden 2020!

While we are staying home to help save lives, your garden can become a great place to improve your wellbeing and support nature. Whether you have a small courtyard or a large garden, here are some simple actions that you can take to attract wildlife:

- Create a log pile as a haven for beetles and other invertebrates
- Grow a nectar bar for bees by sowing wildflower seeds
- Make a small hole in your fence as a hedgehog highway"

Their website (<a href="http://www.digforbracknell.org.uk/yog.html">http://www.digforbracknell.org.uk/yog.html</a>) includes help-sheets that show you other things that you can do for hedgehogs, bumble bees and swifts. They are also running a Wild Garden Awards scheme to encourage us all to put more wildlife friendly features in our gardens. Even if you don't apply for the award, the application form will give you even more ideas about some of the things that you can do in your garden.

Other ideas include no-may May, or creating a secret (butterfly) garden, and building a pond.

If you leave your grass, or part of it, un-mown for a month, especially during spring or early summer, you may be surprised by what grows. There may be wildflowers that will thrive if you don't cut the grass for a month.

The Royal Horticulture Society and the Wildlife Trusts are running a joint campaign encouraging us to make a part of our garden butterfly-friendly by planting and nurturing nectar-rich plants (<a href="https://www.wildaboutgardens.org.uk/">https://www.wildaboutgardens.org.uk/</a>).

The Wildlife Trusts have a step by step guide for building a garden pond (<a href="https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/actions/how-build-pond">https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/actions/how-build-pond</a>). You can also download a leaflet from this site. If you don't have enough space for a pond, then how about building a mini-drainpipe wetland (<a href="https://www.wwt.org.uk/discover-wetlands/gardening-for-wetlands/how-to-build-a-mini-drainpipe-wetland/">https://www.wwt.org.uk/discover-wetlands/gardening-for-wetlands/how-to-build-a-mini-drainpipe-wetland/</a>)?

Some of these projects may require materials or plants that you could struggle to get hold of at this time. You could use social media to see what friends and neighbours might be able to leave on your doorstep for you. You could even try the Binfield Environment Group Facebook group.

#### **PLAY DOUGH**

3G love the play dough. This is a fool proof recipe providing you measure accurately and include the cream of tarter which is essential for elasticity. Enjoy!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

2 cups of plain flour 1/2 cup of salt

2 tablespoons cream of tarter

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

Up to 1.5 cups boiling water (add slowly as required) Food colouring optional

Few drops of glycerine optional but adds more shine

#### **METHOD**

Mix the flour, salt, cream of tartar and oil in a large mixing bowl.

Add food colouring to the boiling water then add to the dry ingredients.

Stir continuously until it becomes a sticky combined dough.

Add the glycerine if used.

Allow to cool down then take it out of the bowl and knead it vigorously for a couple of minutes until all of the stickiness has gone.

This is the most IMPORTANT part of the process, so keep at it until it's the perfect consistency! If it remains a little sticky then add a touch more flour until just right.

Keep it in a sealed container and it will last for months.





They have systems in place and plenty of local volunteers ready to help. We are also supporting Foodbank so please get in touch if you wish to make a donation.

These are difficult times for all of us, but they will pass, and we will be back to normal one day. When we do come out of this, it will be with a renewed sense of pride in the way our community has pulled together and supported each other through these dark days. I'm proud of you all. Those that have volunteered, are helping neighbours, are supporting family and friends, have become the home teacher or the support for a worn out health worker. And those that are just biting the bullet and staying at home to help fight the spread of the disease.

In line with the latest government guidance Binfield Parish Council have taken the following steps:

#### Parks, open spaces & allotments - We thank you for following the social distancing guidance

Play areas are closed, following the government advice received on 23 March 2020

The **Red Rose Allotments** remain open but are subject to the same guidance about social distancing and only leaving home for your one form of exercise a day

The tennis courts are closed, located at Foxley Fields, managed by Binfield Tennis Association

#### Parish Council & Committee meetings

All Parish Council and Committee meetings are suspended

The Council are following robust guidance from the National Association of Local Councils (NALC) to make "business as usual" decisions e.g. grass cutting. However, any new decisions are currently placed on hold.

York Road update – the next decision due was to appoint a contractor but, as no Council meetings are taking place, this appointment decision is on hold.

#### **Events planned for May**

**VE Day** - All activities planned to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of VE Day are now cancelled.

**Binfield 10k** - The Binfield10k Committee have let us know that they intend to postpone the 2020 event and it is now planned for Sunday 11 October 2020.

With no meetings to report on and with beautiful Spring weather encouraging people of Binfield to enjoy their gardens, whatever their size, it may be a good idea to pass on some tips. The following have been offered by some of our trusty committee members.

#### **Roses**.....Bury banana skins around your roses as they provide a range of useful nutrients

**Pruning** .... As a general rule prune spring flowering shrubs immediately after flowering eg jasmine, mahonias, winter honeysuckle.





If you have a new house and the builders have left a thin or rutted layer of topsoil, rake it back and ensure the subsoil is level before you start work. If there is very little topsoil, consider buying some rather than battle with what's there. It can be ordered online for delivery.

For clay soil, make deep beds with virtually no digging and top dress them with free manure from local stables.

Do keep a gardening diary to keep track of what you have sown/planted. Take photos 4 or more times a year because it is very easy to forget names and position of plants.

### Planting tips

Use the black side of old compost bags to line your tubs, basket etc. Put the black side facing out and make some

It may be too late for this year, but don't be too eager to sow seeds outside! Carrots and beetroot sown in mid- April produce far better crops than those sown a couple of weeks earlier.

With garden centres closed, be inventive with all plants...sow any seeds you have and pack anything that grows into containers and they may be fantastic!

General tips......Don't throw out used

tea bags! Put them in the bottom of pots instead of crocks leaving the pot lighter and providing a nitrogen store.

If you do want crocks, use your own broken pots broken up. Use an old scrubbing brush to clean your fork and spade after

Tomato food is good to use on nearly everything without buying specific bottles.

And finally for fun.....Keep witches out of your garden by growing a Rowan tree (sorbus aucuparia)....and to halve your workload in the garden... marry a gardener!!!!

We all look forward to putting this frightening time behind us and the day we can meet up again as a club, but until then stay safe everyone, obey all the advice and be grateful for all the thousands of people still working in all capacities to provide services for us.

On a personal note, this is my daily mantra THIS TOO SHALL PASS.

# Display Screen Equipment Guidance (DSE) for home working

Many of you will now need to work from home for a prolonged period. Laptops are very useful, but there are some potential risks to your health that can be avoided by following this guidance. You may not have a dedicated home office, but here are some ideas to help you stay fit and healthy.

#### **Desk and Chair**

It is important to try and ensure you have a dedicated workspace and reasonable working environment, considering the following points:

- Do not sit in a draft as this can be very uncomfortable and cause stiffness and muscular pain.
- Glare from lights/windows can make it hard to see the screen and negatively affect your posture.
- Keep your workspace tidy and remove non-work-related clutter for space to comfortably access your computer.
- Make sure paperwork and other items do not constrain hand movement and force a twisted posture.
- You could also use props, like books, to improve the height of your laptop, if you have a separate keyboard and mouse to plug in. Even without a separate keyboard, propping up the laptop just at the back can help raise the screen.
- If you don't have an office type chair, select a firm, upright chair, such as those used at a dining table.
- If seated upright for long periods, it is important to support your lower back. If the chair does not do this, try using a pillow, rolled up towel or small garment positioned in the small of your back

(Figure 2).

The height of the chair should allow you to rest your forearms flat on the desk

and if you are seated too low, it may help to sit on a pillow (Figure 2).
If your feet no longer can rest on the floor comfortably, try using a small box or books as a footrest.

The top of the screen should ideally be level with the seated eye height to avoid head tilting or hunched shoulders

# DO NOT put your laptop straight on to fabric as it may overheat

#### Laptop on your lap!

Try not to use the laptop for too long on your lap without a break, as you will find that the screen is far too low and could cause neck pain. It can help to put a pillow/cushion on your lap, with a book or tray on top to raise the screen and improve the angle of your elbows when typing. Note: Do NOT put your laptop straight on to fabric as it may overheat.

#### Rest breaks are important

Rest Breaks are very important whatever Display Screen Equipment you are using, and a very good way to combat musculoskeletal issues:

- Change position frequently where possible to avoid muscles and joints being in the same position for several hours. It could help to move between working locations to spread the load on your neck, shoulders, lower back and arms (Figure 3).
- Try and do some exercise or movement every 1-2 hours. Breaks of 2-5 minutes per hour can offset the risk of musculoskeletal symptoms in the workplace.
- This can involve stretching at your desk, going for a short walk or even just walking up and down the stairs a few times. Try and be creative!
- Drink plenty of water and take a dedicated lunch break.

#### Exercises are good for your health

Here is list of a few small exercises you can try:

- 1. Head Turn: Gently turn head from side to side (Repeat 3 times).
- 2. Lean Back: Gently extend back over backrest of chair (Repeat 3 times).
- 3. Wrist Stretch: Flex your wrist and hold for 5 seconds (Repeat 3 times on each hand).
- 4. Trunk Rotations: Gently rotate your trunk around (Repeat 3 times).
- 5. Shoulder Rolls: Roll your shoulder forwards (Repeat 3 times).

- Aged 70+, in a vulnerable category, or self-isolating for medical reasons.

You will be given full instructions on how the system works, from ordering the books to delivery/collection days for your area.

Staff will select the books that you request. Please note there will be a restriction of 5 books per person per order.

Please be aware that both the staff in the libraries selecting the books and delivery staff will be observing appropriate health and safety measures applicable at this time. All books will be quarantined for 72 hours on return before they can be released for re-issue, in line with Public Health England's guidelines.

Also, we are implementing social distancing measures and delivery staff will not be entering your properties. We shall either leave books outside your front door, or in a designated safe place, and they will be collected without any physical contact between customers and library staff. However, we are happy to chat, albeit maintaining a safe distance.

Please note if you are already registered with our Home Library Service this will continue as normal during this time and you are not required to re-register.

# Advice from the Past: "Pull Together!"

They are among the most vulnerable. They are the most at risk because of their age.

But, are they not also the most inspiring examples of community spirit in the face of adversity?

Our elderly Service veterans have spoken to the generations now coping with a potentially deadly virus and are passing on their experience of how our nation stood together and "rallied around" to defy a wartime enemy.

Old soldier Mervyn Kersch was a schoolboy when evacuated to the countryside with thousands of other children at the outbreak of World War II. At 18 years old he returned to join up and took part in the D-Day Landings. Now more than 90, Mervyn says: "We are in a serious situation. It reminds me of Dunkirk when everyone was shocked.

"But as a nation we pulled together in adversity. In the Blitz and the Battle of Britain everyone stood together and people who didn't know one another rallied around. With Coronavirus, if people pull together, they will strengthen each other."

When just 17 years old, Joan Hall joined to serve in the Women's Royal Air Force while the Second World War was raging. Of the Covid-19 guidance Joan says: "I don't like the idea of staying in for months on end. My twice-weekly dance classes are my activity and they have been cancelled; but I do understand the precautions. Time spent isolated may even motivate people to keep in touch more and talk to one another. I feel especially worried about those trying to keep the money coming in, and my thoughts are with them."

Another child evacuee was Dag Pike who was sent to Cornwall, returning home to London after the Blitz.

"The good thing is that there is still a community spirit when bad events happen. I've had a note through from neighbours telling me there's always help and assistance at hand. Keeping in touch is so important."

The Royal British Legion national contact centre remains fully operational to deal with Covid-19 concerns among the Armed Forces community. The number to call is 0808 802 8080 from 8am until 8pm 7 days a week. The Binfield Legon is staying alert and communicating with members while meetings are suspended, and Branch Secretary Denise Fuller can be contacted at 01344 426885 if advice is needed.






